Wonder City Coffee to host Tellabration

The Locust Grove Arts Alliance will host the Wonder City Tellabration with special guest Cherokee storyteller Sequoyah Guess on Nov. 19, at the Wonder City Coffee Shop.

Tellabration is an annual storytelling event that takes place the weekend before Thanksgiving. It was started in 1988 by the National Storytelling Network, which encourages people to host local storytelling events.

Locust Grove has had a

Tellabration every year since 2006. The Mayes County Storytellers started the event at the LG Community Center. In 2008, it moved to Ruby's Readery bookstore, and from 2012 to 2015, it was held at the Rural Oklahoma Museum of Poetry.

In 2016, the storytelling event moves to the Wonder City Coffee Shop downtown and is sponsored by the Locust Grove Arts Alliance.

Wonder City Coffee is located at 118 E. Main. The event will be from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. and is free and family-friendly.

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Local man publishes first novel

"A strange set of circumstances has placed a good man in a bad situation. Caught flat-footed holding a smoking gun and a dead man at his feet with a bullet in his back, Ty Matthews is forced to leave town in a hurry with a lynch mob on his heels. "

This is the beginning of the book description at Tate Publishing for first-time author, Aaron Doughty.

Doughty is busy promoting his book "Ty Matthews."

This month he'll be at the Heart of Broken Arrow Craft Show on Nov. 12. Will's Country Christmas in Claremore on Dec. 2 and 3 and at the Tahlequah Christmas Bazaar on Dec. 12.

He hopes to have local book signings too.

"Even though the process took over a year from beginning to end, it now seems like it all happened at once," said Doughty.

how to expand his work into a book, Doughty "found a method that works.

"I started with the initial gunfight in the beginning of the book.

"I put myself into the situation and asked, 'What would I do next'?"

"I have thoroughly enjoyed the process of writing and watching the book change from a idea into a published work for all to enjoy," said Doughty.

Tate Publishing relays that Ty must rely on "strength and fortitude" to save his life.

"He didn't know how

many men were on his trail and how far their influence would reach, so Ty must avoid towns and well-traveled trails as he flees for his life.

While no stranger to living off the land, he is forced to endure the struggles of survival in harsh conditions."

Doughty is an avid fan of history, nature, and outdoor survival skills.

His family attends Crossroads Assembly of God church in Chouteau and he helps with a youth ministry group called the Royal Ranger program.

"I am a member of Frontiersman Camping Fellowship through the Royal Ranger program and enjoy taking trips into the historical past as we practice 1800's style camping while reliving our heritage," he said.

Doughty, a 1986 Locust Grove High School graduate, and his wife Darcy have been married 29 years and have three children and


three grandchildren.

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Comic convention coming to Pryor Creek

The Locust Grove Arts Alliance and the Rural Oklahoma Museum of Poetry will both have booths at the Pryor Creek Convention Jan. 21 at the Graham Community Building in Pryor.

People wearing capes, masks and other super hero apparel will likely be on hand at this inaugural event.

Decades ago, comic conventions appealed primarily to lovers of comic books and science fiction.

Now, comic conventions are considered to be pop culture events because the focus has expanded to include TV, movies, toys, action figures, gaming and cosplaying (masquerading as a character from pop culture).

The evolution of cons is one reason why they have exploded in popularity. San Diego Comic-Con, the most well-known comic con, attracts a crowd of 130,000 every July, and tickets sell out immediately after becoming available.

Wizard World stages a series of pop culture conven-

tions around the country, and the first Wizard World Tulsa con in 2014 attracted an estimated 30,000 attendees over three days.

Another reason comic cons have become embraced is because comic fare has gone mainstream, thanks to the success of Marvel and DC movies and because of geek

chick TV shows like "the Big Bang Theory" and "The Walking Dead."

Area comic book and merchandise dealers will be on site for the Pryor Creek Comic Convention. Tulsa World pop culture writer Jimmie Tramel, who bought some of his first comics in Mayes County, is helping to organize

the show.

Like comic cons, cosplaying has boomed in popularity. Prizes will be awarded in different cosplay categories at the Pryor convention.
