Museum receives tax-exempt status

The Rural Oklahoma Museum of Poetry (ROMP), which is located two miles west of Locust Grove on Road 438, has recently achieved its 501 (c)3 status and is looking to expand its visibility.

Shaun Perkins, museum director, is looking for any commercial space in downtown Locust Grove that an owner would be interested in donating to the museum.

If a donation is not possible, a greatly-reduced price or minimal rental fee would also be possibilities. Perkins is not looking to move the museum but to create an annex that would have exhibits and workshop spaces in it.

The annex would be a place to share the museum's work and to offer writing, art, and creativity classes for both children and adults.

The annex would also promote local artists of all kinds and contribute to the vitality and look of downtown Locust Grove.

A donation of property to the museum would be tax-deductible and would constitute a positive commitment to Locust Grove and the arts for all citizens.
