

LGAA wins grant from famed Washington, D.C. institute in 2019

Smithsonian exhibit coming to LG

The Locust Grove Arts Alliance is proud to announce that it has been awarded a grant from the Oklahoma Humanities Council that will allow the LGAA to be the host of the traveling Smithsonian exhibit called Water/Ways in 2019.

The grant was co-written by Marsha Whalen Downum and Shaun Perkins.

Locust Grove was chosen as one of five towns in Oklahoma for this opportunity.

The exhibit, on display for six weeks from Oct. 21 to Dec. 8, 2019, will be housed at Ingram's Custom Rods at the corner of Water and Main. Supplementary activities, such as a Wonder City Wonders Chautauqua, lectures, contests, and more will take place at the exhibit site, Wonder City Coffee and the LGAA gallery.

The LGAA encourages everyone, especially school groups, to experience the free exhibit and the activities associated with it.

Smithsonian's Water/ Ways exhibition dives into water—an essential component of life on our planet, environmentally, culturally, and historically.

In societies across the globe, water serves as a source of peace and contemplation. Many faiths revere water as a sacred symbol. Authors and artists are inspired by the complex character of water – a substance

In June, the LGAA learned it was the recipient of a \$14,475 grant from the NEA Big Read. The LGAA is one of 79 nonprofit organizations (and the only one in Oklahoma) to receive an NEA Big Read grant to host a community reading program between September 2018 and June 2019.

The NEA Big Read in Locust Grove will focus on "How We Became Human" by Joy Harjo. Activities will take place during the month



of April 2019, and will conclude with a visit from Harjo on April 26 and 27, 2019.

Library receives two new grants to enrich communication skills

Exciting things are happening at the Locust Grove Public Library. The library was recently awarded two grants to further enrich the lives of our patrons and the community.

One of the grants paid for the library to become part of the OK Virtual Library consortium, powered by OverDrive, a free service that allows patrons to borrow digital content (like eBooks, audiobooks and videos) anytime, anywhere.

All a library user needs



to get started with free digital content from the library is an internet connection and a library card.

The second grant is for a self-service scanner for the

library's patrons.

With this scanner patrons will have the ability to scan anything from books to photos. Items can be scanned to a flash drive or to a device via a smart dock.

An announcement will be made and an open house is planned as soon as we have the equipment up and running.

Financial assistance for these special projects was made possible with Federal funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services administered through the Oklahoma Department of Libraries.


Monroe competes in World event after finishing at 13th in nationals


More than 55,000 students from 650 schools were involved in the Oklahoma Archery in the Schools program this past year, and Locust Grove's Matthew Monroe was one of 16 of the team selected to compete against the world's best in the NASP World All-Star Championships in July in Calgary, Alberta.

Monroe, a senior, is coached by Ladney Keener,

and earned his way to the World with a 13th place finish at the national competition in May. He also placed 14th of all boys, and 26th in all of 14,319 students.

Described as an allaround kid who participates in football, agriculture, trapshooting, makes good grades and holds down a job, his coach says, "Hard work pays off, and this boy did nothing but work."





Mason Fine leads Mean Green with All Conference honors

North Texas University received a huge gift when they recruited Locust Grove's Mason Fine two years ago to lead its Mean Green Team.


